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## Significant Near Mine Gold Exploration Results in Thailand

Kingsgate Consolidated Limited (ASX:KCN) ("Kingsgate or the Company") is pleased to announce that Akara Resources ("Akara") has intersected significant gold and silver in the highly prospective Jarakae prospect, approximately 7km northeast of the Chatree Gold Mine ("Chatree") within the Company's Special Prospecting Licenses (SPLs) in Phetchabun province.

Reverse Circulation ("RC") drilling was conducted to follow up on last year's significant gold and silver RAB intersections. The previously reported RAB drilling gold intercepts of 2m@1.14 g/t Au and 2m@1.03 g/t Au were reported on 6 April 2023 (see ASX:KCN release, "Significant Gold Exploration Results near the Chatree Gold Mine"). The purpose of this year's RC drilling was to extend the coverage of the mineralised system.

Recent (2024) RC drilling results indicate near surface gold and silver mineralisation with significant intercepts as follows:

**7745RC:** 17m@0.74 g/t Au from 3m to 20m

**7750RC:** 14m@0.63 g/t Au from 9m to 23m and

**10m@0.44 g/t Au** from 70m to 80m

**7766RC: 29m@1.53 g/t Au, 45 g/t Ag** from 3m to 32m including 3m@10.03 g/t

Au, 325 g/t Ag from 17m to 20m and

**13m@0.41 g/t A**u from 46m to 59m

**7768RC:** 22m@0.86 g/t Au from 2m to 24m and

17m@0.90 g/t Au from 27m to 44m

Ongoing RAB drilling continues to discover significant results to the north of the current RC drilling area. Combined with previous results, recent RAB drilling indicates a mineralised system of at least 500m in strike to date. The latest significant RAB results in Jarakae include:

**34356RA:** 3m@2.75 g/t Au from 10m to 13m (EOH) including 1m@7.40 g/t Au,

151 g/t Ag from 12m to 13m in phyllic altered rhyolitic tuff with 1-3%

pyrite

**34358RA:** 4m@2.30 g/t Au from 3m to 7m (EOH) including 1m@5.20 g/t Au, 108

g/t Ag from 6m to 7m in phyllic altered rhyolitic tuff with 1% pyrite

**34359RA: 3m@1.56 g/t Au** from 3m to 6m (EOH) including 1m@3.06 g/t Au, 53

g/t Ag from 4m to 5m in saprolite with quartz vein fragments

RC drilling continues in Kumpee prospect, located 2.5km east of Chatree. Drilling results extend gold mineralisation for at least 400m in a north-south trending system dipping gently to the east. New significant intercepts are highlighted below:

11m@0.77 g/t Au from 73m to 84m

Ongoing RAB and RC drilling will focus in the Kumpee and Jarakae prospects during the current dry season.




Figure 1: Significant RC intercepts, Jarakae (JRK) prospect




Figure 2: Cross section 6650N showing significant Au intercepts, Jarakae prospect




Figure 3: New significant RC drilling intercepts, Kumpee (KMP) prospect




Figure 4: Cross section line 0485N showing significant Au intercepts, Kumpee prospect




Figure 5: Cross section 0535N showing significant Au intercepts, Kumpee prospect
